

#### Paul ends series

THE closing concert in an organ series is being held next Saturday, May 4, in St Albans

It marks the return to the city of Paul Goussot, the winner of the 2011 Improvisation Competition at St Albans and subsequently the improvisation competition in Haarlem.

Paul was born in Bordeaux where he is now titulaire of the prestigious organ in the Abbey of St Croix. He graduated from the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique de Paris where he gained numerous first prizes in both harpsichord and organ.

He has given concerts in Europe and the US including being First Young Artist in residence in

The concert brings together the Caius Consort from Cambridge, directed by **Geoffrey Webber**, and piper **Barnaby Brown**, who leads the revival of the northern triplepipe, the precursor of the bagpipe in Britain and Ireland.

As a result. Celtic chant from the fourteenth century and **Duruflé's** Quatre Motets will be interleaved with Scottish psalm singing traditions. Entrance to the concert, which starts at 5.30pm,

is free with a retiring collection in aid of the International Organ Festival Society. After the concert the audience will have the opportunity to meet the performers at a reception in the cathedral refectory

#### Gallery oils the wheels

SIX leading oil painters will have their work on

**Drew Wilson** of the gallery revealed: "Selecting six artists from such a talented membership could have been an extremely difficult job but actually it was quite easy, as all

the artists I chose were already friends!" He is exhibiting work by Bill Dean, Adebanji Alade, David Pilgrim, Andrew King, Chris Bennett and the president of the institute, Peter

Drew added: "Their styles vary hugely but they all have one thing in common, a strong commitment to upholding the age-old tradition

of painting in oils."

The exhibition begins from 11am to 3pm on Sunday until Saturday, May 11.

# Feeling the Passion with Choral Society

"A WORK that simply shines out as being one of the greatest pieces of all western choral music" is how George Vass, music director of St Albans Choral Society described Bach's St John Passion.

He was speaking after the choir's performance last Saturday in **St Albans Cathedral**.

The older of two surviving Passions composed by J.S. Bach, its dramatic recitatives and choruses are interspersed with reflective chorales and arias, the whole framed by an opening and a final chorus and a closing chorale

The glories of the work were presented in a meticulously-prepared performance by the choir and soloists sung in the original German.

Mr Vass explained: "The piece was composed in

German by a German who knew how to colour his text beautifully. The musical illumination of the text is accented in the right place with stresses on vowel and consonant sounds far easier to produce than any English translation. In particular, the Evangelist's text flows very naturally in the original language.

Assiduous practice and determination resulted in a polished verbal performance worthy of a professional

choir. Mark Dobell in the demanding role as the Evangelist was completely at home in the language, allowing the natural light and shade of the words to

Bass Charles Gibbs as Jesus portraved the quiet assurance of one who accepts his fate for the salvation of Man.

The intervening arias were sung by mezzo, tenor and baritone soloists who also sang the roles of Peter, Pilate and a Maid. **Helen-Jane Howells** is an experienced soloist and Bach singer who performed her arias with a natural ease, her voice carrying in the sometimes difficult acoustic of the Cathedral. She was totally immersed in the music even when not

singing.
Mezzo Clare McCaldin conveyed a tenderness which was moving in its simplicity and Christopher Bowen's high tenor voice was bright and carried well in the louder passages but was also capable of great

Michael Bundy can always be relied upon to give a confident performance although some words were not always clear.

The continuo was provided by Sebastian Comberti (cello), Christian Wilson (organ) and Richard Harvey (harpsichord) with appropriate lightness of touch. The superb musicians of Orchestra Nova played with their usual exemplary understanding of style.

But the evening was mostly carried by the choir who had clearly worked hard on the Herculean task of learning a lengthy text in what is a mostly unfamiliar language.

All voice parts came over well but the sopranos in particular were confident and accurate. Perhaps one could have asked for a little more engagement with the text but considering the challenge of singing in a foreign language, this is nit-pickng.

The chorales were nicely balanced with a lush

warm tone and a good legato line. Although some entries were not clearly anticipated, all the choruses had a very strong finish with the final chorus confident and optimistic.

The choir is at its best when in full cry and the The choir is at its best when in run ory and the closing chorale in particular provided a thrilling finish.
